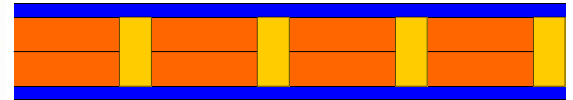

Lion Laurel Scott introduced Tiffany Zoetewey (left) and Misty Barron at our November 9th noon meeting. Tiffany is the CPS Community Engagement Coordinator and Misty is in charge of the Rainbow Room. The Rainbow Room has items needed for children at the Emergency Shelter. The room is open 24/7 and advocates can get whatever items are needed for children who are suddenly taken from an unsafe environment. Over 260 children were served last year. Items urgently needed are car seats and pack & play pens.



The top five of the sixty peace posters entered were displayed at our November 2nd meeting so that the members could pick the top three to win cash and the top poster to advance to the District level. Our thanks to Lion Chandra Eggemeyer who chaired this project and her committee for getting the packets out to the schools and then picking the posters up so they could be judged by the committee and other Downtown Lions.



Lion Gene Lusk introduced Sgt. Justin Baker of the Texas Dept. of Public Safety at our November 9 meeting. Sgt. Baker gave a power point presentation on how to survive an active shooter situation. Be aware of your surroundings, run away from the shooter if possible, hide under solid objects, and as a last resort, fight. Try to keep moving and exit the building as soon as possible. This type of situation can occur any where and any time.



Lion Laurel Scott introduced Melanie Lacy, Office Manager of the San Angelo State Park at our November 16 noon meeting. Melanie talked about many of the aspects of the park such as hunting, overnight cabins, different events sponsored by the park, wild life, pavilion, fishing, etc. There is close to 7,000 acres and 50 miles of trails which can be traveled by foot, horseback, or bicycle. Entrances are at the north and south end of the park and the cost is by the vehicle.



Congratulations to Boss Lion Robert Floyd for winning the \$400.00 jackpot at our November 30 meeting. He has graciously donated it all to the Texas Lions Camp. The jackpot will start over on December 7.



Lion Jeane Taylor introduced Diane Thomas and Scott Holland at our November 30 noon meeting. Diane works for the Sterling County Underground Water Conservation District and Scott works for the Irion County UWCD. The District was created in 1987 to help monitor and track the underground water supply. The District promotes private property rights and the quality and quantity of water. They monitor 39 wells monthly to check on their levels and most of the water is used for livestock and irrigation.
